### The School Day – changes for 2022/3

#### From September, all classes will start at 8:45 am.

Year 5 and 6 will enter via the side gate – Parents should bring their children to the gate, where they will then be met by

Year 5 and 6 parents should enter via the side gate and go to the classroom doors.

Year 5 wear this uniform on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday

Uniform for years 1 - 5





#### Uniform Years 1-5

Children **must** wear the full school uniform **unless** it is a PE day.

#### For Years 1 – 5 the uniform is:

- A white polo shirt
- A Dark Green Cardigan or Jumper
- Dark Grey trousers, skirt or pinafore dress
  - Black/Grey socks or tights
- Smart Black School Shoes (not trainers or boots)

These can be bought from most major supermarkets or from Chroma Sports.

From Reception to Year 2, children are expected to also bring a book bag to school each day – these can be purchased from Chroma Sports.

Year 3 – 6 should bring a bag each day – for Year 5 and 6, this should be large enough to safely carry their ipads

Long hair should be tied back using green or black hair ties/bands. Decorative hair bands (such as unicorns/cats) **must not** be worn to school



# School Uniform - Year 6

(in preparation for secondary school)



Year 6 wear this uniform on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

#### Uniform Year 6

Children **must** wear the full school uniform **unless** it is a PE day.

#### For Year 6 the uniform is:

- A white shirt/blouse
  - House Team tie
- A Grey v-neck knitted jumper
- Dark Grey trousers, skirt or pinafore dress
  - Black/Grey socks or tights
- Smart Black School Shoes (not trainers or boots)

These can be bought from most major supermarkets or from Chroma Sports.

Ties will be provided for every child in Year 6, however if this is lost, parents will need to replace it.

Year 6 should bring a bag each day —this should be large enough to safely carry their iPads

Long hair should be tied back using green or black hair ties/bands. Decorative hair bands (such as unicorns/cats) **must not** be worn to school

## School Uniform – **PE Days** Only

Our PE Uniform is pictured below – children should wear **plain** t-shirts in their house colour, plain black PE Shorts or Joggers. They can also wear a plain black hoodie on PE days

Year 5 wear their sports uniform on Monday and Wednesday


Year 6 wear their sports uniform on Tuesday and **Thursday**

Your child can bring a healthy packed lunch. We are a nut free school (this includes Nutella).

















## High Performance Learning

#### The PKAT iLearn Project

As part of Peterborough Keys Academy Trust, Year 5 and 6 at Ravensthorpe are part of the iLearn Project. This exciting project provides an iPad, with case, pen, charger and headphones to every Year 5 and 6 child across the Trust. The iPads will be used daily in school, so children must ensure that they remember to bring it each day.

At home, the iPad can be used to enhance learning further, including for homework and to access apps such at MyOn and Timestable Rockstars.







#### Our Learning

Year 5 and 6 will start the Autumn Term by studying the Ancient Egyptians. This will include history, geography, science and art.

In English, they will develop their understanding of grammar, cohesion and genres including newspapers and narratives.

In Maths, our initial focus will be on number and place value, before moving to the four operations including written and mental methods.

#### Attendance

Attendance across the school for 2021-22 is just over 90% - we need to be aiming for at least 95% attendance for everyone!

The school cannot authorise holidays during term time. Wherever possible, appointments, including for passports must be made for during the school holiday. We cannot authorise absences where a parent has to travel abroad. For absences relating to funerals or other family emergencies, a short period of absence of not more than 1-3 days may be approved, but must be requested using the online form:

All children will have days when they're not able to go to school, whether that's due to illness, holiday or a family emergency, and the occasional day off is unlikely to affect their education.

However, missing too much school can be seriously detrimental.

A child who misses school just twice per month will lose out on 18 days' education across the school year – that's nearly four weeks.

Missing a few days of school here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on children's learning. Children who miss a substantial amount of school fall behind their peers, and struggle to catch up.

Poor attendance often starts at primary school, and children who fall into this pattern are likely to underachieve at secondary school. Pupils who miss between 10 and 20% of school (that's 19 to 38 days per year) stand only a 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 73% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.

Friendships can be affected by persistent absence, too: it can be hard for a child who misses lots of school to form relationships with their classmates.

### How can I help my child over the holidays?

Our new Year 6 children will be set activities to complete on their iPads over the summer.

Keep reading as much as possible with your child and listen to them read to you. Have a conversation with them about what they have read: what has happened so far? What do they think will happen next? Who are the main characters? How are they feeling? How do they know?

Practise their times tables as much as possible! Children can continue to use Timestables Rockstars, but tables can also be practised when out and about, when waiting in queues or if asking for ice cream! If your child is confident in their times tables in order, test them out of order (i.e. 3x5, 8x7, 6x12) or use the division facts ( $42 \div 7 = ?$ )
