





## 03 Meet the Headteacher



Hello, I'm Mrs Bowyer and I was appointed as Headteacher in October 2023. Many of you will know me as the previous Head of School and before that I was Deputy Head and before that Assistant Head!

Each class was asked to come up with a question to ask me in this week's assembly. This is what they found out...

Sea Eagles asked: as a child, what was your dream job?
When I was 10, I decided I wanted to be a teacher. I had a wonderful Year 5 teacher called Miss Wilson and she inspired me. However, when I tried it as work experience at 14, I didn't really like it! After I had my own children, I realised I really did want to teach and as soon as I started, I loved it!

Martial Eagles asked: who was your favourite teacher as a child and how did they change/impact on your life? I've already mentioned Miss Wilson who inspired me in Year 5 – I remember getting very upset because I really struggled with long division and she made me see that I had to just take it one step at a time. She helped me see that any problem could be solved if you break it down into smaller parts.



Western Ospreys asked how many year groups have you taught in and which is your favourite year group?

I've taught in every year group apart from Early Years, which is strange because that was the year group I always wanted to teach! I don't have a favourite year group as each one is great, but in different ways — I love the joy in Year 1, the enthusiasm in Year 3 and the challenge of Year 6.

Golden Kestrels followed this with: is there a year group you've not taught and why? EYFS is the only year group that I haven't taught at all and as I've said, it was the year group I came into teaching wanting to teach. I spent most of my time teaching in Year 6 and, if you enjoy teaching year 6, you tend to stay there.











Peregrine Falcons asked: how many family members do you have?

I live with my husband and our youngest son. Our daughter is currently away at University.

Year 2 (who are clearly enjoying their Big Cook Little Cook Theme) asked: Who does the cooking at your home?
My husband! I love to bake cakes and decorate them, but he is the cook.

Do you ever eat in restaurants? If so, where is your favourite restaurant?
I do and I love Italian food, so any Italian restaurant.

Sea Eagles asked: personally, what do you think of your role as Headteacher?
I love my job! It can be quite stressful and there is always so much to think about but there are also some amazing moments — like last term's Year 2 assembly (complete with solo), delivering an online assembly to families and their pets during Lockdown or just seeing children enjoy their learning.

Red Kites asked: how is a Headteacher different from a teacher?

What a really good question! As a class teacher, I was responsible for the 30 children in my class — what they learnt, how they learnt it, how they were supported and what they achieved. As Headteacher, I'm still responsible for those things, but now for 360+ children! I also have to look after and lead all our staff, manage the school budget, understand health and safety, oversee all the school policies, work with the Trust and outside agencies and look after Rocky of course! I couldn't do any of those things without the amazing team of staff we have in school.

Merlin Falcons asked: what inspired you to become a Headteacher? I have been very lucky to work with some amazing headteachers during my career. They always put the children at the heart of everything they did and were determined to make their schools amazing places to be for their whole community. When I arrived at Ravensthorpe, I loved the idea of helping everyone to Explore, Succeed and Soar – the staff as well as the children and that is my hope in taking on this role.

Golden Kestrels asked: if you could be any animal, what would you be and why? I've really had to think about this one. My favourite animal is the capybara (it's like a giant guinea pig), but I wouldn't want to be one! I like to travel, so something that travels a long distance, like a dolphin.

Sometimes, we thing of being creative as being something we only do in art or perhaps writing, but that is just the start! 
